Christina Cook Hamman and Cook Family Genealogy

We plan to devote much of this issue of the ECHO to review the Cook family genealogy. The following information comes from a variety of sources. Some information comes from Hamman family records (Doris Rose has been a contributor and manager of this for years), some comes from Ancestry.com, some from Fred Ziegler's data at the Cook's Mill Website (<http://www.cooksoldmill.com/text/genealogy.html>), and some comes from other sources. Information on Familysearch.org seems to be confusing, with a fair amount of incorrect data.

Christina's parents were Valentine Cook and Susanna Baughman Cook. Valentine Cook (he often went by Felty) was born in 1725 in Ayton, Marton-in-Cleveland, Yorkshire, England. He married Susannah Baughman (probably pronounced "Boffman" or "Bockman") about 1750 in York, PA. Susanna was born 24 Aug 1732 in Elgg, Schottenkine, Canton Zurich, Switzerland. When Valentine was six, his father died, leaving 2 orphan sons, Valentine and Jacob. His mother remarried a Mr. Sly. Following the remarriage, the family moved to Amsterdam where Valentine was educated and schooled in both German and English. Here is where he likely picked up the name "Felty". ("Felten" a nickname for Valentine in Frisan German according to Fred Ziegler of Cook's Mill.)

About 1750, the family immigrated to America, where they settled in York Co. PA. By 1763, Valentine was a landowner in Rockingham Co. VA, and in 1773 he moved to Indian Creek, Little Level, Greenbrier Co, Virginia (now Monroe Co. WV). Valentine and his kin erected Cook's Fort near Indian Creek and also built a gristmill. Valentine died December 1797 at Cook's Fort, Greenbrier, VA. There is a headstone in the cemetery with the name "F. Cook" inscribed. It is likely that this is the headstone for "Felty Cook". In his 1797 will, Valentine left the gristmill that had been built on Indian Creek to his wife Susanna. She turned the mill over to her son Jacob Cook in 1798. Susanna moved to Kentucky after Valentine's death. She reportedly traveled back and forth between the Cook's Fort area of WV and the area of Kentucky where some of her children had moved. Susanna died 12 Oct 1807 while on a visit to Cook's Fort.

Valentine and Susanna had the following children: 1) Adam, 2) William, 3) David, 4) Henry, 5) John, 6) Jacob, 7) Christina, 8) Valentine Jr. The exact birth dates and birth order are unknown. Various histories and genealogy trees list different dates. (Some confusion is understandable. Reliable records are scarce. The 1899 Kentucky Tax Lists list 5 William Cooks, 3 Henry Cooks, and 10 John Cooks.)

- 1) Adam Cook, born 1751 York Co., PA, died 1840 in Stanford, Lincoln, KY. He may have been an invalid. The wills of both Valentine and Susanna make mention of the fact that whoever is caring for Adam at the time of Adam's death is to receive his share of the Cook estate.
- 2) William Cook, born 26 Nov 1753 York Co., PA. He died 13 Dec 1790 at Cook's Fort, Greenbrier Co., Virginia
- 3) David Cook was born 25 Feb 1755 in York Co., PA and died 13 Mar 1824 in Stanford, Lincoln, KY. He fought at the Battle of Point Pleasant (along with Phillip Hamman) on 10 Oct 1774. After the Revolutionary War, 21 Jun 1778, David married Sarah Pullen in Virginia. In 1781, David received a land grant for land on the Dix River in Lincoln Co., Kentucky. On 22 Mar 1782, David Cook was wounded in a battle with Shawnee Indians at the Battle of Little Mountain or Estill's Defeat. The battle occurred in eastern Kentucky not far from Mt. Sterling. (See further discussion in article on Estill's Defeat). David and his brother John built a home in the 1790s along the Dix River that is still standing (or at least it was standing in 2008).
- 4) Henry Cook was born in Rockingham Co., VA in 1759. He married Elizabeth Forbis (Forbes) and by 1800, was living in Barren Co., Kentucky. Henry received a land grant of 200 acres dated 26 Jul 1799 plus an additional 200 acres in Barren Co., Kentucky. In 1820 Henry wrote his will and died before 1827. The Henry Cook family Bible was recently owned by Mr. J. M Cook of Horse Cave, Barren Co., KY. The Bible listed names and dates of birth of the children of Henry and Elizabeth Cook.
- 5) John Cook was born January 1759 in York Co., PA and died 27 July 1832 in Stanford, Lincoln, KY. John built a good-sized brick home on the banks of the Dix River in Stanford in the 1790's. John's headstone is located on the family homestead not far from the remnants of the brick home. He married Margaret Forbes in 1787.
- 6) Jacob Cook was born 1762 in York Co., PA. (His headstone in Greenville, WV Cemetery list his death date as May 7, 1844, age 82 years). He is buried at the Greenville Methodist Church in Greenville, Monroe Co., WV. He married Isabella Humphreys on 21 Jan 1796 in Greenbrier, WV. Isabella died in 1814, and Jacob remarried Rachael Carden in 1818. See the link to "Cook's Mill". Jacob formed the first Methodist Society in the area in 1784 and became a preacher in 1788. In 1820, Jacob and his wife Rachael donated land for the Methodist Episcopal Church in Greenville, WV. While his siblings all "moved West," Jacob and his family remained at Cook's Fort for many years.
- 7) Christina Cook was born Dec. 1763 in York Co., PA. She married Phillip Hamman 3 Mar 1780 at Cook's Fort, Greenbrier, VA. Christina moved with Phillip to Kentucky in 1782 with a group of Baughman family kin. On October 12, 1782, the group was camped on the Wilderness Trail near Crab Orchard, KY and was attacked by Indians. In the attack several family members were killed, including Christina's newborn unnamed son, her aunt Margaret Ferrill,

Jonathan Ferrill, two uncles, Jacob Baughman and Hans Heinrich (Henry) Baughman. Christina's grandmother, Margaretha Schwizler Baughman, was also killed. Christina was wounded in the head with an arrow but escaped to a nearby settlement wearing only her "wooley linnens" (nightgown/underwear). This event was referred to as Baughman's defeat.

Christina and Phillip settled in Fayette/Madison Co., KY (1782-1796) where 6 of their children were born. They moved again to Slate Creek, Montgomery Co., KY in 1796. The family moved again in the early 1820's to Jackson Co., AL. Phillip died here in Aug 1832, and Christina died with family in Valley Head, DeKalb Co., AL in Jan 1842.

- 8) Valentine Cook Jr. was born Feb 1764 in York Co., PA. Valentine attended Cokesbury College to become a Methodist preacher and became an itinerant preacher in 1788. Valentine Jr. "was well versed in German. On one occasion, he stayed with a German family, who, ignorant of his knowledge, indulged in many uncomplimentary remarks about him. That night, Valentine asked permission to pray. He began in English, then changed to German. Consternation seized the members of the household when they recalled their remarks, and they fled, leaving him to care for himself." He married Tabitha Slaughter in 1798 and settled in Logan County, KY. Valentine died Aug 1822 in Russellville, Logan, KY. See "Biographical Sketch of the Rev. Valentine Cook, A.M." by Rev. Further Cook Genealogy

According to records in the Hamman files of Doris Rose, the following additional information is provided about ancestors of Christina Cook: **(Note the Generation Numbers are ancestor, not descendant, i.e., 2nd Generation is parents of 1st Generation)**

First Generation: Christina Cook 1763-1842

Second Generation: Valentine Cook 1725-1797

Susanna Baughman 1732-1807

Third Generation: COOK-- John Hamilton Cook, Valentine's father, was born in 1696 in Ednam, Roxburgshire, Scotland. He died before 1738 in England. John married Elizabeth [Easton] Eaton in 1724 in Great Aythton, Marton-in-Cleveland, Yorkshire, England. They had 4 children i) Duncan Cook born 1730 in England ii) Mary Margaret Cook born in 1732 in England iii) Valentine Cook born 1725 and iv) Jacob Cook born BET 1724 and 1728 in Great Ayton, Yorkshire, England

BAUGHMAN Susanna's father was Jacob Baughman Sr., born 22 Mar 1696 in Parish Elgg, Schottekine, Canton Zurich, Switzerland. In 1782 he was living in White Sulphur Springs, Greenbrier Co., VA. He was buried at Cook's Fort, Greenbrier, VA. Susanna's mother was Margaretha Schwizler, born 25 Dec 1695 in Parish Elgg, Schottekine, Canton Zurich, Switzerland. Jacob Sr. and Margaretha were married 8 Mar 1721. Margaretha Schwizler Baughman was killed 17 Oct 1782 on Wilderness Road, Lincoln Co., KY near Crab Orchard at Baughman's Massacre.

Jacob and Margaretha came to America in 1744, arriving in Philadelphia from Switzerland. Christina's uncle, Henry Baughman, built Baughman's Fort in 1754 on the Greenbrier River, near present-day Alderson, WV and was killed at the fort by Indians in 1755. The Baughman's owned land in Greenbrier Co., VA adjacent to Valentine Cook on Indian Creek, near Cook's Fort.

By 1780, some Baughmans and Cooks had already moved on to an area of Kentucky near Lincoln Co. (Kentucky was not yet a state, and this area was felt to be part of western Virginia). Jacob Baughman Jr. laid claim to 400 acres on the Dix River near Gilbert Creek. David Cook obtained a land grant and purchased land in the same area. Baughman Station and the land of Jacob Baughman Jr. were immediately across the Dix River from the land David Cook and John Cook owned in Lincoln Co., KY. In 1779 Jacob Jr. died, and his son Henry laid claim to his land. In 1782, Henry Baughman returned to Virginia to bring other relatives from Greenbrier Co., VA with him back to Lincoln Co., KY. It was on the return trip to Kentucky in October 1782 that the group was attacked by Indians during what would be called Baughman's Massacre. (further Baughman details are found in "Lincoln County Kentucky", Turner Publishing Co. 976.9625 D2e.

Battle of Point Pleasant-- 1774

Two of our ancestors, **Phillip Hamman and David Cook**, fought in the Battle of Point Pleasant. Point Pleasant sits at the junction of the Ohio and the Kanawha Rivers. In 1774 the Virginia militia was marching into the Ohio Valley. On October 10, 1774, the Battle of Point Pleasant was fought between the Virginia militia and Shawnee and Mingo Indians. The Shawnee Indians led by Chief Cornstalk attacked the militia led by Colonel Andrew Lewis. The Virginians lost about 75 killed and 140 wounded. Both "Phillip Hammon" and David Cook" were in Captain John Lewis' Company of Volunteers from Botetourt County. Also mentioned in this battle were

Henry, John and William Cook. It is unlikely that the Henry, John or William Cooks who also fought in this battle were related to Valentine and David Cook as they came from a different county in Virginia. Estill's Defeat or Battle of Little Mountain

In 1782 Shawnee and Wyandotte Indians attacked several settler stations in central Kentucky. After attacks on Strode's, Estill's, Hoy's, and Bryan's Stations, Captain James Estill organized a group of men, including **David Cook**, to pursue the marauding Indians. On March 22, 1782, Estill's group of 25 men caught up with the Indians at Little Mountain near Mt. Sterling, Kentucky. David Cook was a bit ahead of the group and fired at an advancing Indian while another Indian stepped into the line of sight. The shot, which killed both Indians, was witnessed by Estill's entire group.

Reports were that the battle lasted only about 2 hrs. but resulted in a high number of casualties on both sides. Seven of Estill's group were killed, including Captain Estill. Four were wounded, including David Cook, who was shot in the shoulder. About 20 Indians were felt to have been killed.

One of Estill's group, named Miller, was said to have defected during the battle and fled rather than staying to help the battle. David Cook was upset by Miller's failure to remain and help. David Cook threatened to kill Miller if he ever came back to his area. For further information on Estill's defeat ----

Site Visit to John /David Cook Home Lincoln Co., KY

At the Hamman reunion held in Lexington, KY in 2008, a group of Hamman kin was able to visit with Charles Hackley and Ann Wyler, both direct descendants of David Cook. Charles and Ann lived in Stanford, KY.

They agreed to meet us and take us to the site of the John and David Cook home along the Dix River near Stanford. Charles and Ann took us to an old brick home built by John Cook in the 1780's.

David received a land grant for 115 acres in 1781 near the Dix River in Lincoln Co., Kentucky (Kentucky was not made a state until 1792). Charles began telling us stories about the house and about David and John Cook. Charles told us that David was able to purchase additional land in this area.

He sold the land to his brother John. The 400-acre farm lies along the Dix River and was called the John Cook Farm. John and his family lived there from the mid 1780's until John died in 1832. There's a small family cemetery near the brick house where John Cook, his wife, and several family members are buried.

At the time of our visit in 2008, Charles was 84 years old and Ann was 79. But they both were sharp and clear-minded. In the 1990's Charles was able to buy back the John Cook Farm. The Hackley family still raises cattle and corn on the farm. The original brick house is still standing on the farm. The home was built out of bricks made in the 1780's on the Cook farm. Charles pointed to slight depression in the land down by the river, "where they got the clay to make the bricks." The bricks had to be heated to make them hard, and bricks that were not hard enough remained soft like chalk. These defective bricks were placed in the spaces in the exterior walls between stud supports to give extra insulation. These inside bricks could still be seen on one of the exposed walls. The home was in disrepair, but folks lived in the house as recently as the 1980's.

Charles related other stories to us while there at the farm. He told us that as a young man, David helped survey this area for Daniel Boone in the late 1770's. As payment for his work, David was promised 400 acres of land. David settled on this parcel of land. He later sold the land to his brother John Cook. Charles told us his version of the battle of Estill's defeat. He related the story of how David Cook killed 2 Indians with one shot. He stated that after Captain Estill was wounded and lay dying, his men became disorganized and began to retreat. David was struck in the shoulder by a rifle ball and was left by his partners. The Indians had too retreated. David knew they would be back to collect their dead. He found a tree that had been broken over but still had leaves. He hid under the leaves and branches. Sure enough, the Indians returned. They looked around, removed their dead, and left. David found his way back to his home and sought medical care for his wound. The ball had gone clear through his shoulder. The doctor told David that the only way he could survive was to clean the wound out. David got a piece of clean silk and pushed it through the wound and pulled it out the other side. The process was repeated until the wound healed. David survived. Charles had other stories about David Cook's exceptional strength and endurance. We visited with Charles and Ann in August 2008. Sadly, Charles became ill in the fall of 2008 with a respiratory illness and died in October 2008.

- M vi. **Joaquin BAUGHMAN** was born on 30 June 1737 in Parish Elgg, Schottekine, Canton Zurich, Switzerland. He died after 1745 in American Colonies.
Joaquin was also known as Joseph.
- M vii. **Hans Conrad BAUGHMAN** was born on 10 July 1740 in Parish Elgg, Schottekine, Canton Zurich, Switzerland. He died after 1745 in American Colonies.

8. **John COOK** was born about 1670 in Probably, Arran Island, Buteshire, Scotland. He died after 1710 in probably England. John married Jean DUNCAN on 19 January 1692 in Ednam, Roxburghshire, , Scotland.

Where did the Cook family originate?

The Cook surname comes from Old English, and is common throughout the English-speaking world. The origins of the surname Cook are occupational, derived from the word 'coc'. This name could be used to describe someone who not only cooked, but sold cooked meat, or ran an inn or eating-house.
